At their January craft day at Redington Memorial Home, they helped residents make valentines for their loved ones and friends. The residents, in turn, helped club members make valentines for the veterans at Togus.

At their January meeting they had a speaker from Skowhegan's "Main Street" project. It was good to hear what is planned for the community, where we were and where we hope to go. Downtown Skowhegan is moving in the right direction with added businesses and updated buildings and landscape. As it's name implies, Skowhegan is "A place to watch".

At their February meeting the guest speaker was our own GFWC member and Recording Secretary, Crystal Tufts. She spoke to them regarding her new business venture in Home Care and Companionship. She stated this is becoming the way of the future as the elderly live longer and more of them wish to stay at home. Crystal has been in the health business for years and for the past 17 years, has been in charge of Redington Memorial Home. This was most informative to members.

They continue to be involved with the Skowhegan 3 Library Project as it winds to a close. Although much work and time was given to this cooperative project, the rewards were greater. Working together, they learned that a better bunch of women can not be found.

GFWC/The Dove Society of Skowhegan met recently to plan their 2nd Annual Luck of the Draw fundraiser. Last year's event was very successful and a lot of fun. The auction will be held again in the Skowhegan High Cafeteria on March 31st from 10am to noon. Participants buy sheets of tickets and place a ticket in a paper bag next to the item they would like to win. At noon, club members will draw a ticket from each bag and the winner announced and presented with their items. Members also provide several hot dishes that may be purchased such as chili, dynamites, and macaroni and cheese plus sandwiches and lots of wonderful dessert items such as Karen Nelson's famous

chocolate cake with peanut butter frosting. Cold beverages will also be available. Due to the generosity of our wonderful community, many gift cards and free services will be available as prizes. Other items include toys, clothes, jewelry, baskets, artwork, exercise equipment, dishes and many handmade items. All receipts from this fundraiser go into a scholarship fund which awards scholarships to graduating seniors during final ceremonies.

Also, on March 2, Dr. Seuss's birthday, some of their members go to local first grades and read a Dr. Seuss book to the classes. They will then present the book to the students for their classroom libraries. This year they will be reading one of their favorites, "IF I RAN THE ZOO".

GFWC/ Livermore Falls Women's Club gathered together in January for their annual "Doris' Brunch". Four local organizations who receive annual donations from the club were given the opportunity to tell new members what they do and what kind of impact they have on the local community. "Friends Together", "Spruce Mountain Ski Club", the area chapter of "Special Olympics" and the local food cupboard all brought information about their importance to the area. The brunch was delicious, as usual, served by "La Fleurs" Restaurant in Jay. After the program there was a raffle of a coffee basket with fresh scones, a tea basket, a kitchen basket, a bath and bubble basket, along with a large collection of books, a

Subway book of coupons and a hand painted barrel stave. Lots of happy ladies went home with something new!

The club completed their domestic violence "Step Away From Abuse" project and the socks went to Safe Voices (previously AWAP) in Lewiston. A workshop to prepare for the "I Feel Pretty" Domestic Violence Program meeting in May was held at Vice-President Linda Burdo's home. Thirty cosmetic cases with toiletries and goodies were packed as well as twenty children's bags and a half dozen men's bags to be presented at that meeting.

GFWC/Semper Fidelis Club wrapped up 2011 with a new fund raiser for their scholarship fund. They took orders for poinsettias and delivered the beautiful plants to customers three weeks before Christmas. It was a success and plans are underway to include this as an annual fund raiser. Members also participated in the Family Violence Project's Christmas program. They adopted a mother and three children who had been displaced from their home due to domestic violence. The mother provided them with a "wish list". Members donated items on the list plus club donated an additional \$150 for a member to shop for items on the list. Each family member, including the mother, received five gifts.

At their January meeting they welcomed a speaker from the American Cancer Society. There is a great need for drivers to transport patients to chemotherapy

and radiation treatments. Many patients in central Maine are skipping treatments because they don't have transportation. The American Cancer Society has a program where individuals offer their time, even if it is just a few hours a month, to drive patients to their appointments. They also met a second time in January to watch a power point presentation by Jen Olsen of Main Street Skowhegan. Jen informed the club of all that Maine Street Skowhegan has accomplished over the past few years and some wonderful projects they are working on for the future of downtown Skowhegan.

Waterville Hospice spoke at their February meeting on the growing number of Alzheimer's and dementia patients that this program is dealing with. The power point presentation was eye opening, as many of our members have and are dealing with a family member or friend that has this disease. The club was shown "activity aprons" that are being made for the patients that keep their hands "busy" with zippers, buttons and pockets. Apron patterns were provided and they will be purchasing materials to make a few of the aprons to donate to this cause.

Lake George Winter Carnival was on our agenda for February. We supplied a warm fire and made s'mores for the children and their families who attended this wonderful event. There was just enough snow to make the box sled race a success (99 entries), the day was sunny and beautiful and the event drew the largest crowd

ever. What more could you ask for?!

District 3

Cosmopolitan Club of Dover-Foxcroft, gathered at a nearby restaurant and celebrated the holiday season together with a luncheon and the fact that they had adopted an 18 month child for Christmas. This project is dear to their hearts! Mother Nature had it in for club members in January this year, on the 2 Fridays they were scheduled to meet- it was dangerous to be out and about-so they stayed home!!! In February club members met and made valentines for the residents of 2 assisted living homes in Dover-Foxcroft. Movie night was a success as members watched "The Help". The maid, Minnie, won best supporting actress- she deserved it.

Meetings of the GFWC/Outlook Club in Hartland have been well-attended this club year, with nearly three-quarters of the membership at any given meeting - well up from the five attending last spring. In November, the group was pleurably entertained by an accordion player. The December meeting featured relaxing breathing techniques presented by member Dr. Kathie Clark, then a reading of the Christmas story and spirited singing of Christmas carols. For January, retired teacher and member Mary Helen Thorne read humorous excerpts from 'Owls in the Family', from an old fourth grade reader. Minor changes have been voted to our by-laws, a

creative way to deal with the GFWC Maine dues increase was proposed and accepted for trial, and continued financial support for Maine Youth Leadership, the state president's special project (Operation Smile) and our district art contest has been approved.
