We are hoping to fill 20 bags for the children. Many of the children that arrive at the shelter do so with only the clothes they are wearing, so we are in hopes that our project will bring a little bit of comfort to them. We were thrilled when Nan Bell of the Family Violence Project called this a true "Collaboration" of the Skowhegan community!

Art Sampler

It's time to think about the art shows in each district and get a head start on the project. Check your directories for the rules.

We focus on the visual arts through the sponsored programs of high school student art shows and club woman photography contests, but there are many other arts that we can spot light as Art Samplers in programs and projects. Your club could have programs on theater, music, and poetry and short story readings. Fiber arts are now often seen at

the Common Ground Fair where a variety of fibers are displayed with an item as an example. Maine Fiberarts, location in Topsham, provides education in fiber arts, knitting, dying, needle felting, and wheel spinning, celebrating fiber art in a craft and farm environment.

Several club women are Quilters. Quilting can be a fun individual or group project where the finished item could be used for a raffle fund raiser. Scrap booking is also an art where creative cutting, arranging, and layering enhance the pages for a professional look. Add a little music to round out the Art Samplers. Does your club have a member that can play an instrument or sing? Encourage her to share her musical talent with the group. Please consider adding an art program to your club calendar.

The art department will continue an art fund raiser at the spring convention. Several people have donated items for this project and more are welcome. The items can be your own art work or art work of someone else. Items can be any thing that is artistic and could include paintings, craft, fiber and cloth items, jewelry, pottery, and sculptures, to name a few. Please let me know if you have a donation. We raised over \$100 last time and would like the proceeds to go to an art scholarship. Thank you to all those that helped with donations for the raffle and to those who purchased tickets.

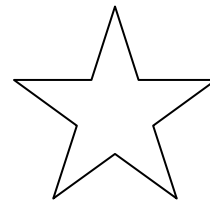
Remember – If you are a volunteer you are a leader!!

We do our very best to keep the operating cost of this organization to a minimum and I think you will agree that not having a state dues increase in over 20 years demonstrates that. Membership numbers are down considerably in the past 20 years as well, so this adds to a loss in revenue, in addition to the increased costs due to 20 years of inflation.

This important announcement was shared at our fall conference and also has been sent to club presidents. It is being published here as additional outreach to help insure all our club members are informed in timely fashion. Again, this will go into effect when dues are being collected for the 2012 Administration. Thank you!
